The purpose of <u>Priority List of Indicators for Girls' Menstrual Health and Hygiene:</u>
<u>Technical Guidance for National Monitoring</u> is to provide guidance on a recommended short list of indicators to monitor national progress towards supporting MHH among adolescent girls in and out of school. These indicators monitor MHH across priority domains and are intended to enable comparability across countries and over time.
