Nationwide Study of Short-term Exposure to Fine Particulate Matter and Cardiovascular Hospitalizations Among Medicaid Enrollees

The association between short-term PM2.5 exposure (average of PM2.5 on the day of hospitalization and the preceding day) and CVD admissions rates among adult Medicaid enrollees in the continental United States (2000-2012) was estimated using a time-stratified case-crossover design. This analysis was repeated at PM2.5 concentrations below the WHO daily guideline of 25 μ g/m. The PM2.5-CVD association in the Medicaid \geq 65 years old versus non-Medicaid-eligible Medicare enrollees (\geq 65 years old) was compared. A robust evidence of an association between short-term PM2.5 and CVD hospitalizations among the vulnerable subpopulation of adult Medicaid enrollees was found with 0.9% increase in CVD admission rates per 10 μ g/m PM2.5 increase. The association was stronger at low PM2.5 levels. Among Medicaid enrollees \geq 65 years old.

Responses of rice qualitative characteristics to elevated CO2 and higher temperature: Implications for global nutrition

Protein and some minerals of rice seed are negatively affected by projected carbon dioxide (CO2) levels. However, an in-depth assessment of rice quality that encompasses both CO2 and temperature for a wide range of nutritional parameters is not available. Using a free-air CO2 enrichment facility with temperature control, a field experiment with two levels of CO2 (ambient; ambient + 200 ppm) and two levels of temperature (ambient; ambient + 1.5 °C) was conducted. An in-depth examination of qualitative factors indicated a variable nutritional response. For total protein, albumin, glutelin, and prolamin, elevated CO2 reduced seed concentrations irrespective of temperature. Similarly, several amino acids declined further as a function of higher temperature and elevated CO2 relative to elevated CO2 reduced the overall lipid content. At the nutrient elements level, whereas elevated CO2 reduced certain elements, a combination of CO2 and temperature could compensate for CO2 reductions but was element dependent. These data indicate that climate change is likely to significantly impact the nutritional integrity of rice, with subsequent changes in human health on a global basis.
